Staff Connection...

“I AM THE LIVING BREAD THAT CAME DOWN FROM HEAVEN” (JOHN 6:51)

In his October 24, 1996, pastoral letter— *From east to west a perfect offering*— Bishop Matthew Clark states, “Our Diocesan Mission Statement and Synod Values represent the deepest, most systematic expressions of the hopes of the people of our local church.” Our Diocesan Mission Statement challenges us to become the people God is calling us to become. “We, the Catholic Church of the Diocese of Rochester, joyfully embrace our baptismal call to worship God, to preach the good news of Christ, to build up the community of faith and hope in the Holy Spirit, and to serve those in need. As pilgrims nourished by the Eucharist for our journey of faith, we work with other churches and with all who seek harmony within the human family to advance the reign of God. Continuing our diocese’s century-old tradition of courage and creativity, and responding to the Second Vatican Council’s call for the ongoing conversion of the Church, we strive to meet the needs of our community in this time and this place.” (Our Parish Mission Statement—on the front of our bulletin—brings this home for us here at Immaculate Conception Church.)

The Bishop goes on to state, “The actions of the assembly of gathering, listening and responding to the Word, giving praise and thanks, eating and drinking, and finally going forth in love and service. By these actions we remember and re-enter Jesus’ life, death, and resurrection.”

Today as we celebrate the feast of the **Most Holy Body and Blood of Jesus**, we need to ask ourselves: “How are we, each in our own lives living out the Bishop’s challenge?” We come not as a people bound by an obligation (the Third Commandment). We need to hear the words of God, be nourished by the Body and Blood of Jesus to receive the courage and support of the assembly to go and live the Mass. We are here as the Body of Christ to receive the Body of Christ, to be the Body of Christ to others. **Pope Pius XII** stated this in his encyclical—Mystici Corporis Christi—“*The Body of Christ...is the Church*”.

During Mass we are to listen to God’s Word and internalize them for ourselves. What is God saying to me today? At Mass we come ready to be nourished for our journey. The Communion Minister says, “The Body of Christ”/“The Blood of Christ”. **Upon hearing those words said to us, we bow and adore with our—AMEN.** It is an action within a spiritual dialogue (**words—bow—word**). Our adoration is to Jesus present in the Blessed Sacrament **in front of us**, not shielded by the person in front of us.

On a personal note—it makes me feel so good when I see parishioners reaching out to help others at Mass. This, to me, should be an expression as how our call, because of our Baptism, is to reach out to **all we meet** each day.

The challenge is not easy or it would not be a challenge. Encouraged by God’s Word, nourished by the Eucharist, and supported by the assembly, how can we miss living the Mass—what we were called to do.

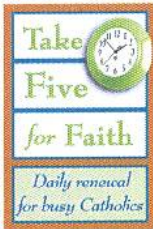

SUNDAY, JUNE 26, 2011 SOLEMNITY OF THE MOST HOLY BODY AND BLOOD OF CHRIST
Don't forget where you come from

When the Israelites stood on the verge of entering the Promised Land, Moses, who was standing at the end of his life, told them not to forget the God who had led them out of slavery and sustained their lives in the desert. Saint Paul also had a reminder when he wrote the Corinthians not to forget that their sharing in the bread and wine made them one. And Jesus reminded his hearers that partaking of his body and blood led to eternal life. On a day such as today, when we celebrate something as familiar to us as the sacramental presence of Christ, it's good to remember what it means.

MONDAY, JUNE 27

FEAST OF CYRIL OF ALEXANDRIA, BISHOP, DOCTOR OF THE CHURCH
No one is an island

We proudly claim to be rugged individualists. Surely the joy of the American experiment is that we can be whatever we want, try new things, reinvent ourselves more than once along the way. Yet we don't exist alone on this planet, nor do we live without meaningful commitments and obligations to others. As Saint Cyril said: "By nature, each one of us is enclosed in his own personality, but supernaturally, we are all one." If we follow Jesus, we bind ourselves to his way. If we emphasize our relationship to more worldly things, we are bound to those instead.

TUESDAY, JUNE 28

A calm port in a storm

The world has seen its share of disasters, both natural and of human origin: earthquakes, floods, hurricanes, tornadoes, oil spills, and wars, to name a few. People also experience their own personal catastrophes: illnesses, deaths, losses of jobs and homes, the crumbling of families and relationships. Such events can give us some perspective on biblical stories like the one about the sleeping Jesus and his scared-to-death disciples on a storm-tossed boat. It can be hard to trust God—or anyone for that matter—when events threaten to overcome us. It is at those times, though, that trust is most needed. Take some biblical advice. Jesus "rebuked the winds and the sea, and there was great calm." In the face of calamity, the voice of God is not in the sound and fury but in the stillness of your heart.

WEDNESDAY, JUNE 29 SOLEMNITY OF PETER AND PAUL, APOSTLES
An odd couple but a good team

Saints Peter and Paul are forever linked as key figures in the success of the newborn Christian way. It's unlikely, however, that there will ever be a buddy flick about them. Peter was one of the first apostles called, and Paul the last; Paul was an educated Pharisee, Peter probably illiterate; Peter was a companion of Jesus, Paul never knew Jesus until after the Resurrection. The thing that linked Peter and Paul was their passion to tell the world the good news about Jesus. Oh, and both of these pillars were flawed by bad choices, stubbornness, disloyalty, hotheadedness. Peter

and Paul were made saints by God's grace, just as you and I will be if we commit ourselves entirely to Jesus and his mission.

THURSDAY, JUNE 30

Get moving!

Paralysis takes two forms: physical and spiritual. Spiritual paralysis prevents us from moving forward, speaking out and speaking up, saying or doing what we know is right. All we have to do is look around at the unprecedented shape our country is in—fighting two wars, at a time of high unemployment, with an over-extended budget that leaves no money for infrastructure, healthcare, or education—to know that paralysis is epidemic in the United States. Today is a good day to pray that our world leaders, elected officials, and we ourselves may be healed of our spiritual standstill.

FRIDAY, JULY 1 SOLEMNITY OF THE MOST SACRED HEART OF JESUS
Follow a heartwarming devotion

Devotion to the Sacred Heart of Jesus emphasizes the long-suffering love and compassion of Christ toward all humanity. Compassion is the sum of wisdom and grace. If we choose to embrace it as our guiding principle, it can point the way to a generous and virtuous life. A litany to the Sacred Heart includes the following lines—perhaps you will want to make them your own today: "Heart of Jesus, house of God and gate of heaven. / Heart of Jesus, glowing furnace of charity. / Heart of Jesus, vessel of justice and love. / Heart of Jesus, full of goodness and love. / / Heart of Jesus, most worthy of all praise."

SATURDAY, JULY 2 FEAST OF THE IMMACULATE HEART OF MARY
Clean up your act

The word *immaculate* means "clean"—more specifically "without flaw." The church calls the heart of the Blessed Virgin Mary immaculate because she was the mother of Jesus, who was without sin, the major human flaw. That's the theological reason. But how can we imitate such perfection? Humanity is anything but immaculate. Our limitations frequently point to our distance from divine perfection. What Mary had, though, is purity of heart: She always sought to understand, open herself to, and follow God's will for her. Her intention was to listen for God's intentions. While we may not be able to achieve Mary's perfection in responding to the promptings of God, we can imitate her willingness to seek God's desires for ourselves.

TODAY'S READINGS: *Genesis 27:1-5, 15-29; Matthew 9:14-17 (573)*

FOURTEENTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

The rest is easy

We Americans are proud of our work ethic—perhaps too proud. We tend to value our work and busy-ness so much that we forget how to be still enough to hear God's quiet voice. We need leisure—not frenetic vacationing or compulsive recreational activities but simple rest when we can unplug and *think*. Jesus says, "I will give you rest." We may think he means *eternal* rest, but we don't have to wait until we're dead to enjoy it! We need to develop a pattern to "come away and rest awhile." Why not today? Why not every Sunday? The media is full of "new" and flashy ways to avoid stress, but Jesus' invitation is a simple, standing one: "Come to me, all you who labor and are burdened, and I will give you rest."

TODAY'S READINGS: *Zechariah 9:9-10; Romans 8:9, 11-13; Matthew 11:25-30 (100)*

"My yoke is easy, and my burden light."

MONDAY, JULY 4

Have a little faith

Some people seem to be born with the gift of deep faith. They appear to have an intuitive grasp of the spiritual side of life and to know God is always with them. The rest of us must endure long periods of doubt and uncertainty that are only occasionally interrupted by brief moments of spiritual clarity. Whether our assessment of other people's faith is accurate, our time might be better spent considering the state of our own. We could begin by asking, "Where am I on the continuum between faith and doubt?" Is it possible that the Lord is with you and you don't know it? Can you ask God to help you to know it?

TODAY'S READINGS: *Genesis 28:10-22a; Matthew 9:18-26 (383)*

TUESDAY, JULY 5 FEAST OF ANTHONY MARY ZACCARIA, PRIEST

Forty hours to a renewed spirit

One of the more fervent prayer practices in Catholic tradition is the Forty Hours' Devotion, and Saint Anthony Mary Zaccaria (1503-1539) was a major promoter of it. The devotion involves continuous (or near continuous) prayer for 40 hours before the Blessed Sacrament, which is exposed on the altar. The devotion arose during the Counter-Reformation, a time of church renewal and reform in response to the criticisms of those involved in the Protestant Reformation. If your spiritual life could use some reform and renewal, try participating in a "40 Hours."

TODAY'S READINGS: *Genesis 32:23-33; Matthew 9:32-38 (384)*

"Jacob said, 'I will not let you go until you bless me.'"

WEDNESDAY, JULY 6

Thy kingdom come

More than anything else, Jesus has one basic message: The kingdom of God is at hand. He proclaimed it had begun and was on its way to fulfillment. In it is everything he was, taught, did, and wants us to learn and do: Love God and one another wholeheartedly, especially those who are deprived in some way. Forgive as God has forgiven you. Be open to a new and different way of seeing the world and acting, one that brings everyone together in God. Are you ready to enter the Kingdom?

TODAY'S READINGS: *Genesis 41:55-57; 42:5-7a, 17-24a; Matthew 10:1-7 (385)*

"As you go, make this proclamation: 'The Kingdom of heaven is at hand.'"

THURSDAY, JULY 7

Love is bigger than hurt

Joseph had it tough as the second youngest in a family of 12 brothers. Picked on and hated because he was his dad Jacob's favorite, Joseph ended up sold into slavery by his brothers. After many years of separation from his family, he again meets his brothers, only this time the tables are turned: Joseph is in a position of power, and his brothers are the vulnerable ones. It wouldn't have taken much for Joseph to tap back into those feelings of hurt, betrayal, and rage and respond measure for measure. But he went beyond that, back to the sibling love he so cherished, and reacted with not only kindness but an outpouring of generosity. We, too, have that capacity and power for a love that is bigger than hurt.

TODAY'S READINGS: *Genesis 44:18-21, 23b-29; 45:1-5; Matthew 10:7-15 (386)*

"But [Joseph's] brothers could give him no answer, so dumbfounded were they at him."

FRIDAY, JULY 8

Get smart, but keep it simple

Sometimes it may seem that the gospel's call to simplicity doesn't stand a chance. Popular spiritual writer Henri Nouwen expressed this dilemma well: "So often the problems of the world seem so complex and intricate that your word strikes me as embarrassingly simple," he wrote in a prayer that continued, "but you, O Lord, said, 'Be clever as serpents and innocent as doves.' Let me retain innocence and simplicity in the midst of this complex world." That's a good prayer for all of us as we try to balance spiritual life and daily life.

SATURDAY, JULY 9

AUGUSTINE ZHAO RONG, PRIEST, MARTYR, AND COMPANIONS, MARTYRS

Delve into the mysteries of the church in China

Some say that the Roman Catholic Church in China is actually two churches: one faithful to Rome and the other beholden to the state. The reality is much more complex, though there have been some deep divisions. Many in China felt that the timing of the canonizations in 2000 of the 150 martyrs the church remembers today highlighted China's colonial past—a very sensitive subject for the Chinese people. A year later Pope John Paul II, addressing a group of Chinese and Western scholars in Rome, asked forgiveness for the past failings on the part of Christian missionaries in China. 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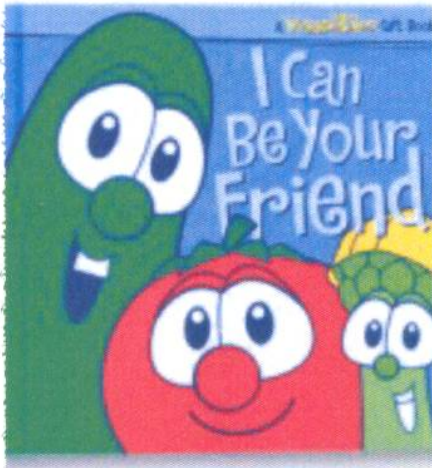
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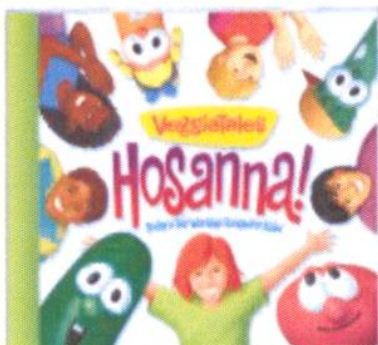

SECOND COLLECTION—BUILDING MAINTENANCE

THIS IS A STATEMENT THAT WAS READ OVER THE PA SYSTEM AT THE FOOTBALL GAME AT ROANE COUNTY HIGH SCHOOL , KINGSTON , TENNESSEE BY SCHOOL PRINCIPAL, JODY MCLEOD.

"It has always been the custom at Roane County High School football games, to say a prayer and play the National Anthem, to honor God and Country."

Due to a recent ruling by the Supreme Court, I am told that saying a Prayer is a violation of Federal Case Law. As I understand the law at this time, I can use this public facility to condone sexual promiscuity, by dispensing condoms and calling it, "safe sex." If someone is offended, that's OK.

I can even use this public facility to present the merits of killing an unborn baby as a "viable" means of birth control." If someone is offended, no problem...

I can designate a school day as "Earth Day" and involve students in activities to worship religiously and praise the goddess "Mother Earth" and call it "ecology.."

I can use literature, videos and presentations in the classroom that depicts people with strong, traditional Christian convictions as "simple minded" and "ignorant" and call it "enlightenment.."

For me to do otherwise would be inconsistent at best, and at worst, hypocritical. I suffer from that affliction enough unintentionally. I certainly do not need to add an intentional transgression. For this reason, I shall "Render unto Caesar that which is Caesar's," and refrain from praying at this time.

" However, if you feel inspired to honor, praise and thank GOD and ask HIM, in the name of JESUS, to Bless this event, please feel free to do so.. As far as I know, that's not against the law---yet."

One by one, the people in the stands bowed their heads, held hands with one another and began to pray. They prayed in the stands. They prayed in the team huddles. They prayed at the concession stand and they prayed in the Announcer's Box! The only place they didn't pray was in the Supreme Court of the United States of America- the Seat of "Justice" in the "one nation, under GOD."

Somehow, Kingston , Tennessee Remembered what so many have forgotten. We are given the Freedom *OF* Religion, not the Freedom *FROM* Religion. Praise GOD that HIS remnant remains!
