Staff Connection...

COFFEE HOURS

Several years back we participated in a "Disciples in Mission" renewal program. After the program formally ended, we had a special Reflection Day during which parishioners came to discuss some new goals for our Parish to consider. As a result of this listening session, it was concluded that we needed to become a more Welcoming Community. Of course the best way to do this was to initiate a Welcoming Committee to discern ways to act upon this request. Thus our COFFEE HOURS were born.

This grass roots initiative has led us to having 2 Coffee Hours monthly, from September to June. They are after the 8:30 and 10:30 Masses the second and fourth Sundays of the month. Since its inception, about 35-60 attended each of these gatherings on a weekend. It has proven to be a source of community building and welcoming new parishioners and renewing acquaintances. It is a "welcome wagon" to visitors. One weekend a bus from Brooklyn stopped by for Mass and the tourists came for coffee and hospitality before continuing their journey of the Finger Lakes. Of course all this doesn't happen by accident. Several regular groups (Small Christian Communities, Immaculate Conception School, the Filipino Community, Mercy Associates, Hospitality/Welcoming Committee, and the Knights of Columbus) make up our present teams.

We are looking to establish more human resources, namely your involvement in helping to continue the success of this endeavor. You can sign up individually, yet work as a team. You would be ministering in an informal, relaxed atmosphere with other parishioners. It is a good way to be involved and meet other folks. There is a "job description" and willing mentors available to help you walk through a morning and a list of competent bakers ready to share their baked goods.

This is for you if you want to meet more wonderful people like yourself. The time to come by is from 7:45 – 8:00 on your assigned day to prepare and set up, be there to greet the attendees after the Masses and clean up which takes about 1/2 hour, because many hands make light work.

Your rotation schedule would depend on the regular groups as well as how many new groups can be formed. (Perhaps families may like to join together to share in this ministry.)

TWENTY-FIRST SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

Wonder as you wander

Poets can see the world through the eyes of a child. They are forever trying to get us to perceive the extraordinary in the ordinary: the outlines of bare trees in winter, the loveliness of a simple yellow rose, or the way a late afternoon shadow falls on a wall. We don't often see these daily miracles without prompting; their very familiarity renders them all but invisible. As the poet John Donne observed, "Nay, the ordinary things in Nature would be greater miracles than the extraordinary . . . if they were done but once." Being a grown-up doesn't have to mean we're hopelessly blind. Today, ask God for the gift of wonder and awe.

MONDAY, AUGUST 22

This idol you don't want to win

Idolatry—the worship of false gods—gets a lot of attention in scripture. Turning to other gods than God was about the worst thing the Israelites could do. Jesus spoke out about it, too, and reserved some of his harshest language for the Pharisees and scribes who valued the gold of the Temple more than the One whom the Temple wealth was supposed to serve. In other words, they made an idol out of money by putting it ahead of God. Do you have idols in your life? What is between you and God? Take some time to examine your life and if necessary rearrange your priorities.

TUESDAY, AUGUST 23 FEAST OF ROSE OF LIMA, VIRGIN

It's always family hour

Saint Rose, who lived in Lima, Peru some 400 years ago, is considered patron saint of the resolution of family quarrels. To live the ascetic life she desired, she herself had to struggle against her family's wishes. Given the degree of family strife we hear about, witness, or perhaps even experience ourselves, no saint could be more timely for our troubled age of fractured families. One sees the evidence of wounded families at every turn—in crime and drug abuse, prison populations, among friends and acquaintances. Perhaps we, too, in our own small way, can be a "patron of family healing." Reach out to a hurting friend or relative—perhaps under your own roof—with prayer and compassion.

"We were gentle among you, as a nursing mother cares for her children."

WEDNESDAY, AUGUST 24 FEAST OF BARTHOLOMEW, APOSTLE

Be quiet!

For all the airtime the 12 apostles receive, there are some we know precious little about! Saint Bartholomew, for example, is mentioned only four times in the Bible as merely a line item in the list of apostles. But don't let that fool you into thinking that our veneration of Bartholomew is misplaced. While tales of healing and conversion, mission trips and heroic faith are great sources of inspiration, there is also a place for the many apostles

and disciples who lived faithfully yet in relative obscurity. They remind us that our own hidden acts of kindness, personal sacrifices, quiet prayers, and humble works are infinitely valuable in the kingdom of God.

"The wall of the city had twelve courses of stones as its foundation, on which were inscribed the twelve names of the twelve apostles of the Lamb."

THURSDAY, AUGUST 25 FEAST OF JOSEPH CALASANZ, PRIEST

The measure of success

How do you determine how well you're doing? By having the right friends? Saint Joseph Calasanz was friends with Galileo—not a good idea at that time in the church. He was also well-born but renounced his inheritance in favor of the priesthood. Founding a community for the education of poor children, he was accused of causing social unrest by encouraging the underclasses to seek better for themselves. Considered incompetent, Joseph was removed as superior and lived to see his order, the Piarists, dissolved by the pope. After his death the order was reformed and continues its good work today. The measure of our lives is more than meets the eye.

FRIDAY, AUGUST 26

Don't worry about dates and times

Whether it's Harold Camping and his followers who were ready to be raptured on May 21, 2011 or those who believe the so-called winding down of the Mayan calendar in December will trigger cosmic cataclysm, some people see the need to set a precise date for the end of the world. For Christians, however, the exact scheduling of The End flies in the face of Jesus' own words on the subject: "Stay awake, for you know neither the day nor the hour" (Matt. 25:13). It also ignores the fact that in a sense he *never left*: He has been, is, and will be with his people until the end of the age. If you are attentive to Christ's presence in each and every hour, you'll be ready when The Hour rolls around.

SATURDAY, AUGUST 27 FEAST OF MONICA

Pray your way

Monica is the patron of mothers of difficult children. As the mother of Saint Augustine she knew more than a little about the subject. She followed her wayward son from Carthage to Rome and Milan, all the while weeping and begging him to reform his ways. She also prayed—a lot. We know the story ends happily: Augustine was baptized and became one of the most influential thinkers in all of Christian history. Yet even Monica would probably admit it was not her crying and cajoling that helped turn her son around. It was her prayers. Being a parent is hard, to put it mildly. If you are struggling with an errant child, take a page from Monica's book and pray—a lot.

Be a fool for God

Prophets sometimes complain that their job description is too demanding. But one of the strangest of these laments is that of Jeremiah who claimed that God had tricked him into his vocation! “You duped me, O Lord, and I let myself be duped!” or as another translation says—perhaps even more poignantly—“You seduced me!” And when the prophet tries to ignore his calling, it burns inside him until it succeeds in bursting forth to do the work for which it was sent. While we may not rank with a biblical prophet, each of us does have a vocation to speak and act with compassion, justice, and tolerance when anyone is deprived of these basic dignities.

TODAY’S READINGS: *Jeremiah 20:7-9; Romans 12:1-2; Matthew 16:21-27 (124)*

MONDAY, AUGUST 29

FEAST OF THE MARTYRDOM OF JOHN THE BAPTIST

Prepare the way for peace

The Palestinian city of Nablus is an important hub of urban life in the West Bank. If ancient tradition is to be believed, it is also the burial place of John the Baptist. Mention of his relics being honored there dates to the fourth century. Today the revered tomb is housed in the Nabi Yahya Mosque, or “John the Baptist Mosque.” So it is that one of Christianity’s most revered prophets and saints occupies a special place of respect in the Islamic world. Perhaps John has not stopped proclaiming a prophetic message. If he has earned the respect of Muslims as well as Christians, surely we can follow his example today in these troubled times for interfaith relations. Be a voice for peace and toleration.

TODAY’S READINGS: *1 Thessalonians 4:13-18 (431); Mark 6:17-29 (634)*

TUESDAY, AUGUST 30

Be ready for a change

In his fascinating book *War*, journalist Sebastian Junger recounts his experience embedded for almost a year with American combat troops in Afghanistan in 2008. He often speaks of the soldiers’ constant, riveting awareness—not only in a firefight but all during their deployment—that any moment might literally be their last. They saw it happen often enough to know it was true. There is not enough adrenalin in the world to keep one at such an intense level of readiness for very long. Yet Saint Paul and Jesus both use the utter unpredictability of life to encourage us always to live in such intimacy with the Lord that even the most unexpected events will not throw us completely or forever off balance.

TODAY’S READINGS: *1 Thessalonians 5:1-6, 9-11; Luke 4:31-37 (432)*

“The day of the Lord will come like a thief at night.”

WEDNESDAY, AUGUST 31

When three is not a crowd

Good things can come in threes, like faith, hope, and love—to which the church has applied the traditional name of the “theological virtues.” These are grand words Christians use a lot, but what do they mean in the concrete lives of people and communi-

ties? Take hope, for example. Scripture is clear: It comes from God. It is a gift. People tend to think of hope as something that gives them a reason to go on. For people of faith, hope is that, but more. “Going on” is going on to a future full of life with God. What do you hope for?

TODAY’S READINGS: *Colossians 1:1-8; Luke 4:38-44 (433)*

“We have heard of your faith in Christ Jesus and the love that you have for all the holy ones because of the hope reserved for you in heaven.”

THURSDAY, SEPTEMBER 1

Reach beyond patience

In the confessional recently a friend admitted she lacked gratitude. “I hate my life!” she told the priest. To her surprise he accepted her frank admission. “Some people suffer from poor health, others from a poverty of peace in their circumstances,” he observed. Then he advised her: “Pray for peace. Not for patience to simply bear your life, but peace to fully live it.” Many of us endure seasons when our days feel unfruitful, our efforts seem purposeless. We lower the nets, again and again, and come up empty. In these hours, pray not for patience but for an enlivening peace.

TODAY’S READINGS: *Colossians 1:9-14; Luke 5:1-11 (434)*

“We have worked hard all night and have caught nothing, but at your command I will lower the nets.”

FRIDAY, SEPTEMBER 2

Present and accounted for

There are some places in the Bible where scripture boils down the gospel message to a concise statement. In the New Testament letters, one place is Philippians 2:6-11. Another is Colossians 1:15-20. Both these passages serve as mini-creeds about what Christians believe about Jesus. In Colossians, words very much like a hymn of praise say God is present in a person, Christ. That belief not only says God is present in Jesus but also that *Jesus is present in God*, and it puts Christ first among all creation and at the head of the body of his people, the church. Try praying with these passages today!

SATURDAY, SEPTEMBER 3

FEAST OF GREGORY THE GREAT, POPE, DOCTOR OF THE CHURCH

Liturgy of the hours, for the ages

Perhaps it is no accident that Pope Saint Gregory the Great, who died in 604, is known as the “Father of Christian Worship.” After all, he was the first pope to come from a monastic background, and no group has done more to preserve our great liturgical traditions than monastic men and women. When the medieval world around them was falling into darkness; when triumphant Christendom threatened to turn liturgy into a pageant; when some took the Counter-Reformation to extremes; all the while monastics patiently and quietly preserved some of the best and most cherished forms of worship. Perhaps it is time to plan a retreat at the guest house of a monastery in your area. They’ve kept the light on for you all these centuries.

TODAY’S READINGS: *Colossians 1:21-23; Luke 6:1-5 (436)*

- Whether you decide to dress formally or casually, you will want to make the most of this opportunity.

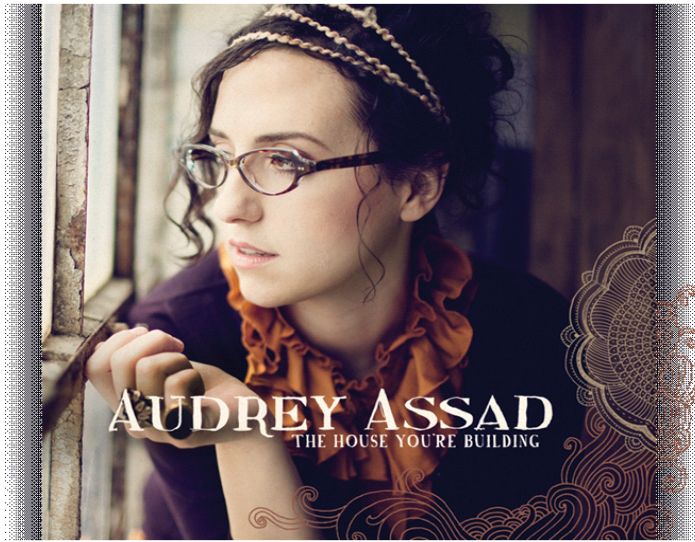

Last year on the first Sunday of October in more than 1,800 locations in 1,500 cities and towns across the United States and Canada; tens of thousands of pro-life people gathered to pray silently beside major streets and hold professionally-printed signs that are provided at the site.

Again this year they will peacefully show solidarity in the Christian community for the sanctity of human life from conception to natural death. They will stand in honor of the 50 million lives who have been lost to abortion.

Every year young women report deciding not to have an abortion after reading the signs and seeing the people praying. Students who participate understand that a third of their generation has disappeared and then convince their friends at school not to kill their baby. Numbers of people step into volunteer pro-life positions after being part of a Life Chain - becoming more aware of the need to pray for people in crisis situations.
