### Staff Connection...

#### SAYING GOODBYE TO CHRISTINE SANCHIRICO

After five and one half years as Director of the Catholic Charities of Tompkins/Tioga Christine has taken a position as Administrative Manager of the Department of Ecology and Evolutionary Biology at Cornell University. Truly she will be a loss at Catholic Charities but a real asset at Cornell. Over the years Chris has helped to further the mission of Catholic Charities—to help build communities that care for all people by reducing poverty, promoting healthy individual and family life, collaborating with community agencies and faith communities and advocating for social justice.

The flexibility and adaptability of their mission allow them to create programs that address gaps in local services. They are committed to avoid duplication of any existing programs in the county. One of their most critical services is providing crisis relief for Tompkins County households who are not eligible for other support services, who are in short time crisis situation (laid off from work, recent divorce/separation, short term medical condition of self or dependent, domestic violence situation) and who are at risk of falling into “situational” or “episodic” poverty, where a single crisis starts a chain of reactions that leads to a downward spiral that can include job loss, family instability, long term debt, substance abuse, and/or homelessness.

In 2010, CCTT’ Samaritan Center provided over 40,000 clothing items to 1451 households consisting of 2,699 individuals. They provided personal need product packages to 4,129 individuals, and emergency assistance (rent, utility payments, security deposits, prescription and care repair) to 338 households.

The Parishioners here at Immaculate have helped to make all of this possible. Our “white bags” and “loose change” collections during Lent usually comes to between \$2000—4000 to help CCTT minister to others. We also have blue bins in Church during July and January to collect personal items. Parishioners have been part of the Regional “Soap for Hope” collection of personal items. This year there were 2,497 assorted items collected through the generosity of those who gave. The Students of Immaculate Conception School have contributed through their annual Christmas gifts and clothing.

**SUNDAY, JULY 24, 2011**  
SEVENTEENTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME  
**King Solomon's mines**

It's ironic that sometimes when scripture talks about how there are more important things than money and possessions, it uses money and possessions to do so! King Solomon, for example, told God he would rather have wisdom than riches and a long life. God gave him that—and threw in wealth, glory, and a long life anyway. In the gospels Jesus speaks of buried treasure and an expensive pearl to emphasize the value his disciples should place in finding the kingdom of God—which of course doesn't have much to do with accumulating money. We need to see beyond the surface of what money does and does not buy to the true riches in our lives: faith, hope, and charity.

**MONDAY, JULY 25** FEAST OF JAMES, APOSTLE  
**Become a saint in one word**

What makes an apostle or saint? Look at the words of Saint Paul in his letter to the Christian community at Corinth and there you will find the essence of any apostle or saint in one lowly conjunction: *But*. Afflicted, perplexed, persecuted—*but!* Paul reminds us that true apostles and saints of God are ordinary people who struggle with the contradictions in life *but* who do not let themselves be defined by them. Saint James, like his fellow apostle, Paul, lived these words to the max. Jesus had given James the heads-up that he'd be facing many an obstacle, but James remained true to his identity in God. Try this fill-in-the-blank spiritual exercise: "I am [e.g., afflicted] *but* [e.g., not constrained]."

**TUESDAY, JULY 26**  
FEAST OF JOACHIM AND ANNE, PARENTS OF THE BLESSED VIRGIN MARY  
**Pass along your hand-me-downs**

We know nothing for certain about the parents of the Blessed Virgin Mary, but it doesn't matter. In the same way that we know God through his Son Jesus, we can know Anne and Joachim through their daughter Mary. It was through these two that Mary learned about prayer and work, family and community. It was Anne and Joachim who taught their daughter to love and trust God enough to say, "May it be done to me according to your word." Faith, like the color of our eyes and hair, is passed down from generation to generation. Today may we remember that our words and actions will continue to reverberate for years to come, even to our children's children's children. Let us speak and act accordingly.

*"The righteous will shine like the sun in the Kingdom of their Father."*

**WEDNESDAY, JULY 27**  
**What's it worth to you?**

Jesus' metaphor that the kingdom of God is a "pearl of great price" so precious that a person would sell all their possessions to have it may seem extreme. However, Jesus is not giving out financial advice. He is exaggerating to make a point about which he has no doubt: that God and God's reign over us is all that matters. Often it's only when we are pushed to the brink, when

we're confronted with losing it all, that we realize what really matters, what the "pearl" is and what it means. Furthermore, *you* are such a pearl to Christ; he laid down his life to possess you. Breathtaking, isn't it?

TODAY'S READINGS: *Exodus 34:29-35; Matthew 13:44-46 (403)*

*"The Kingdom of heaven is like a merchant searching for fine pearls."*

**THURSDAY, JULY 28**  
**Travel light**

Most tabernacles these days are pretty fancy places, far removed in size and style from the original dwelling place of God, which was a tent in the desert. Moses built it, but the master architect was God, who delivered the blueprint on Mt. Sinai. It served as the dwelling place of the Most High but it had to be lightweight and portable if it were going to accompany the Israelites on their wanderings in the wilderness during the Exodus. It does us well to remember that God does not need a fancy house to feel at home and travel among us. We are a pilgrim people, and it is good to stay in touch with our roots. Anyone up for camping?

**FRIDAY, JULY 29** FEAST OF MARTHA  
**The work of prayer**

Twice in the gospels we hear of Saint Martha: once, in Luke, when she complained to Jesus that her sister Mary was spending too much time at his feet while she was doing all the cooking and serving, and the other, in John, when she went out to meet Jesus after the death of her brother Lazarus. In Luke Jesus reminded Martha of how being attentive to his presence has to accompany serving others—something she seemed to recognize in John: "I have come to believe that you are the Christ, the Son of God, the one who is coming into the world." Martha's message to us: Prayer without action leads to an incomplete faith life, but so does action without prayer.

**SATURDAY, JULY 30**  
FEAST OF PETER CHRYSOLOGUS, BISHOP, DOCTOR OF THE CHURCH  
**A case of mistaken identity**

Unlike Saint Peter Chrysologus, the fifth-century bishop who parlayed his friendship with an emperor into striking examples of early Christian art in Ravenna, Jesus' encounter with the government was not so happy. Herod Antipas had heard of someone called Jesus who was going around doing mighty deeds. Herod's only experience with such a figure, however, was John the Baptist, who was dead, so, he thought, might "Jesus" be John come back from dead? Of course Herod was wrong on that count. He not only failed to recognize Jesus at first but also the fact that all power comes from God. How it's used is up to human beings.

*"This man is John the Baptist. He has been raised from the dead; that is why mighty powers are at work in him."*

EIGHTEENTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

### What does your bread buy?

It is not always easy to distinguish between what is and is not bread—what will and will not fail to satisfy. Many things we spend our money on do, in fact, satisfy. Sometimes they even make possible a more joyful life: a big, comfortable chair, for example, especially if it's used regularly to read with a small child. The truth is we always know what will lead to a more love-filled life and what will not. It just takes some time to surface. Give some thought today to what you value.

## MONDAY, AUGUST 1

FEAST OF ALPHONSUS LIGUORI, BISHOP, DOCTOR OF THE CHURCH

### Let's not go to extremes

Skeptics abound. Those who retain their faith are tempted toward the fringes: a severe expression of religion that lacks mercy or a laxity that makes everything seem relative and even irrelevant. Does that sound like a description of our generation? Actually, it's how many described the 18th century. In that divided age Saint Alphonsus Liguori became the champion of the middle ground. "Nothing else is required than to act toward God, in the midst of your occupations, as you do toward those who love you and whom you love." In good times and in bad, love knows how to behave.

## TUESDAY, AUGUST 2

### Let's hear a shout-out for humility

You have to admire Moses. Two people close to him—Aaron and Miriam—had started asking why *they* couldn't be prophets, too. To settle the matter God called the three of them out for a talking-to: God trusted Moses, God said—end of argument. What's more, God punished Miriam with an instant case of leprosy. But Moses just as quickly asked the Lord to forgive Miriam. We see something similar when Jesus called Saint Peter to walk out on the water to him. Peter's initial faith sank pretty quickly once he was out on the water, but Jesus caught him before he could go under. It's a virtue to keep faith—and to reach out a forgiving hand to others when they have not kept faith with you.

*"Why, then, did you not fear to speak against my servant Moses?"*

## WEDNESDAY, AUGUST 3

### Get a new perspective

The story of Jesus' encounter with a Gentile woman distraught over her daughter's illness is troubling. Not only does Jesus seem reluctant to help, but he even calls her a dog, as if to dismiss her as not worthy of him. The woman is undaunted and persists, and Jesus not only relents but is profoundly impressed. While we may not like seeing Jesus in this unkind light, the point may be that Jesus—human like us in all things but sin—*learns something*

in a human way. When the wideness of God's mercy confronts cultural prejudice, Jesus matures in his thinking, just as we all do if we are open to the grace of seeing beyond our assumptions.

## THURSDAY, AUGUST 4 FEAST OF SAINT JOHN MARY VIANNEY, PRIEST

### The call is here and now

Saint John Vianney was a member of an endangered species—a French Catholic priest in the aftermath of the French Revolution. Times were difficult and persecution of the church had been heavy, yet Vianney found a way to live his vocation with such devotion that the town of Ars where he was posted attracted thousands of pilgrims a year. It is said that in his final years he put in 16 to 18 hours a day in the confessional. Though he yearned for a life of quiet contemplation, he stuck it out. The lesson for all of us: Our call to serve begins right here, right now.

## FRIDAY, AUGUST 5

DEDICATION OF THE BASILICA OF SAINT MARY MAJOR IN ROME

### Let it snow

The longer a building has been around, the more likely it is to attract legends. Few structures have stood longer than the Basilica of Saint Mary Major of Rome, which dates to the fourth century. Perhaps it is no surprise that this beautiful basilica—the largest in the world to honor the Mother of God—has attracted its share of lore. According to one story, a wealthy Roman couple pledged their fortune to Mary, and she responded with a miraculous summer snowfall, instructing them to build a church on the site. Today, the day of dedication for "Our Lady of the Snows" has sometimes been celebrated with a shower of white rose petals released from the basilica's dome. If a white rose is not at hand, wear something white today to honor the Blessed Mother and the buildings dedicated to her.

FEAST OF THE TRANSFIGURATION OF THE LORD

### Be all that God wants you to be

The ways faith can transfigure us may not be as dramatic as the Lord's—whose "face shone like the sun" and "clothes became white as light"—but they are just as real. Step into a meeting of Alcoholics Anonymous and listen to the stories of how faith has transformed people's lives. Look at the icons of pop culture who credit their own creative transformations and success to God. During the final episode of her namesake show, Oprah Winfrey said: "Nothing but the hand of God has made this possible for me." What has the hand of God made possible in your own life? What more needs transformation? Ask and receive!

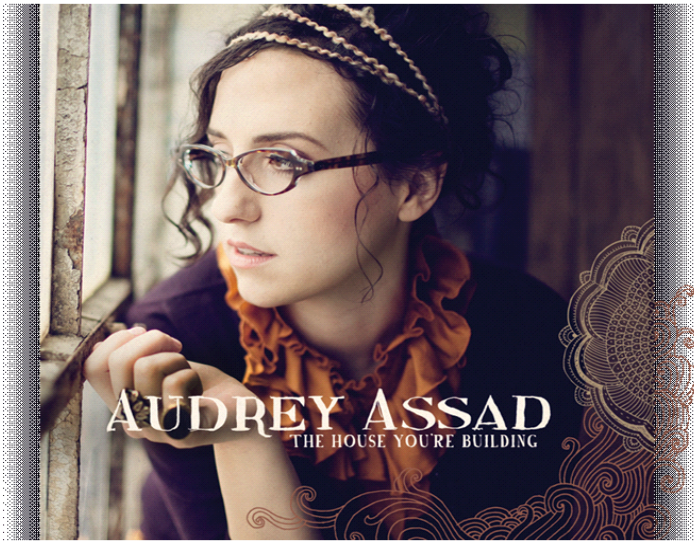
