FEAST OF THE HOLY FAMILY OF JESUS, MARY, AND JOSEPH A change in plans

Dreamers can't explain themselves. People ask: "How could you? Why did you?" And dreamers shrug and smile. They make the sacrifice, they take the risk, they think differently, they become someone unimaginable. Ask any artist or composer, star athlete or entrepreneur, priest or monk or missionary: How did you become what you are? They shrug and smile, because it's hard to tell someone who hasn't heard the voice themselves: I talk to angels, I listen to the universe, I close my eyes so I can see more clearly. Sit and pay attention to the holy silence.

TODAY'S READINGS: Sirach 3:2-6, 12-14; Colossians 3:12-21 or 3:12-17; Matthew 2:13-15, 19-23 (17). "Rise, take the child and his mother, flee to Egypt, and stay there until I tell you."

SIXTH DAY WITHIN THE OCTAVE OF THE NATIVITY OF THE LORD Generation to generation

The gospel anticipates the New Year with a child's potential. After Simeon's harsh prediction of a sword piercing Mary's soul, Anna comforts. She directs the conversation back to thanking God. She has had time to prepare for her moment, so when it comes, she rises to the occasion. Pope Francis linked Anna and Simeon to grandparents. In a society that too often dismisses the elderly, grandparents still offer time and presence, just what children need most. Pray for and honor the elders in your own family and community. They carry a consoling message!

TODAY'S READINGS: 1 John 2:12-17; Luke 2:36-40 (203). "The child grew and became strong, filled with wisdom."

MEMORIAL OF SYLVESTER I, POPE; SEVENTH DAY WITHIN THE OCTAVE OF THE NATIVITY OF THE LORD

Guard the pearl of great price

We know little of Sylvester I other than that his papacy lasted from 314 until his death in 335. A legend arose around the eighth century, however, based on a forged document known as the Donation of Constantine, that the emperor who famously converted to Christianity also transferred authority over Rome and the entire Western Roman Empire to Sylvester and future popes. While the document was later proven to be a fake, the papacy nonetheless got ensnared in power politics, luxury, and the corruption that comes with trying to rule an empire. As Dante put it in his *Divine Comedy*, "Ah Constantine, how much evil was born / not from your conversion, but from that donation / that the first wealthy pope received from you!" Don't practice your faith for worldly gain—God grants us riches money can't buy.

TODAY'S READINGS: 1 John 2:18-21; John 1:1-18 (204). "He was in the world . . . but the world did not know him."

OCTAVE DAY OF THE NATIVITY OF THE LORD; SOLEMNITY OF THE BLESSED VIRGIN MARY, THE MOTHER OF GOD

Incarnation in all

The Octave of Christmas reminds us that all people everywhere share in the mystery of Incarnation, the communion of divinity and humanity, revealed in Jesus Christ and realized in all who are likewise born of women. We celebrate this mystery whenever we gather to eat and drink the sacred meal. Our task is to recognize the divine presence in the least of those with whom we share this mystical communion, from the baby born in Bethlehem to the migrant standing at our wall. Resolve this New Year to lend a helping hand.

TODAY'S READINGS: Numbers 6:22-27; Galatians 4:4-7; Luke 2:16-21 (18). "So they went in haste and found Mary and Joseph, and the infant lying in the manger."

MEMORIAL OF BASIL THE GREAT AND GREGORY NAZIANZEN, BISHOPS, DOCTORS OF THE CHURCH

Let's be friends

"To the Ancients, friendship seemed the happiest and most fully human of all loves; the crown of life and the school of virtue. The modern world, in comparison, ignores it." When C.S. Lewis referred to the "Ancients" he might have had today's saints, Basil and Gregory Nazianzen, in mind. Instrumental in the formation of the Nicene Creed that the church recites each Sunday, these great bishops and doctors of the church can also be remembered simply for being two great and lasting friends. Let them remind us that deep and warm friendships enrich life in ways that accomplishments and honorifics, and even creeds, sublime as they may be, cannot replace.

MEMORIAL OF THE MOST HOLY NAME OF JESUS Called by name

The memorial of the Most Holy Name of Jesus reminds us of the power of names. We honor not just the person Jesus, but the name of Jesus. There is a certain intimacy in knowing a person's name. Think of our litanies, our prayers for people who are sick or who have died. Think of the genealogy we heard on Christmas Eve. When we name people, we acknowledge and see them. Think of the people you see regularly in your school, workplace, gym, grocery store, faith community. Remember to call them by name.

TODAY'S READINGS: 1 John 2:29—3:6; John 1:29-34 (206). "John the Baptist saw Jesus coming toward him and said, 'Behold, the Lamb of God.'"

MEMORIAL OF ELIZABETH ANN SETON, RELIGIOUS

Be a trailblazer

Elizabeth Ann Seton (1774-1821) was born into a wealthy Episcopalian family. At 19, she married William Magee Seton with whom she had five children. For a brief time, it was a wonderful life, but soon William's business and health failed. Elizabeth was a poor widow and single mother by the age of 30. Inspired by Catholic friends who helped care for her dying husband, Elizabeth became Catholic in 1805. In the following years this first American-born saint established many firsts: the first religious community of women and the first Catholic school, with several more to follow. Elizabeth Ann Seton's deep faithfulness reminds us that nothing is impossible with God.

Physically frail and undereducated, he was given the work of doorkeeper at Montreal's Notre Dame College. He greeted and prayed with visitors, asking Saint Joseph to intercede for all who came seeking physical healing. In time, people came simply to pray with Brother André. When he died at age 91, more than a million mourners came to honor the Miracle Man of Montreal. Greet everyone today with love and compassion.

Tuesday, Jan 07, 2020 MEMORIAL OF RAYMOND OF PEÑAFORT, PRIEST Good works live on

Today the church honors the brilliant Dominican Saint Raymond of Peñafort (d. 1275). At the behest of the pope, he organized decades of church decrees into the *Decretals of Gregory IX*, which made a major contribution to the development of Canon Law, and as head of the Dominicans, he wrote a congregational constitution that lasted nearly 700 years. Saint Raymond had no way of knowing his contributions would have such enduring impact. As you use your talents to help build the Kingdom for good, remember that your contributions are part of a lasting legacy.

Dear Birthright Friends and Family,

Merry Christmas and Happy New Year!

Last year I wrote our newsletter to go out at Thanksgiving time in order to help with my busy holiday schedule. However, this year I chose to wait as I wanted to write about our recent anniversary celebration.

On Saturday, November 16th, we celebrated 38 years of Birthright in Ithaca. We chose to make it a threefold event; to honor our beloved director of 35 years, Mary Camobreco, to celebrate 38 years of our mission with a luncheon, and to also use the time as a fundraiser; holding a 50/50 raffle and silent auction at the same time. It was truly a lovely, fun, and successful event.

94 People joined us to honor Mary Camobreco including her children. Fr. Tony Mugavaro who helped get Birthright of Ithaca started back in 1981 and our regional NYS Birthright director also joined us. Both had many beautiful words to say about Mary and her devotion to our organization. She has been such an inspiration to all of us.

I would like to thank the efforts of Carolann Darling who initiated and was the primary person to get the ball rolling on this fundraising event. Without her we could not have pulled it off. It truly was a lovely event filled with many blessings. It was overwhelming to see the outpouring of love at this event. Thank you to all who came to help us celebrate.

I thought I would share a couple of Birthright facts with you that I discovered when preparing to speak at the luncheon. Since Birthright opened its' doors on November 16, 1981 Birthright has had over 13,074 visitors to our office (there are two years I couldn't find stats for). We have given out 1,041 pregnancy tests. There have also been numerous home visits and phone calls, all in the effort to help women to choose life. I believe the numbers prove we are effective in our endeavors to promote life giving options to our clients.

This year from November of '18 - October of '19 we have had 299 office visits, given out 292 packages of diapers, 45 containers of formula, 14 layettes and helped 5 women out with financial aid. We have received, 244 phone calls in our office. Though we have slow days, we never have slow months. We are blessed with donations of clothing, diapers, and formula from time to time. These items are greatly appreciated by our clients.

This year has been full of blessing as we carry out our mission to assist women in crisis and unplanned pregnancies:

In January I was asked to speak by Ithaca Loves Life for the local March for Life. It was a privilege to speak to about 60 people regarding the mission of Birthright. The talk and march to Planned Parenthood was followed by a funeral reception put on by the Knights of Columbus. It is a beautiful thing to see so many people involved in preserving life.

In February we were blessed with a \$6,000 grant from the Triad Foundation. We are still hoping to use this grant to help us address the issue of moving to a more conducive space for our organization. We also received a Consistent Life Ethic Grant form the Rochester Diocese Catholic Charities in February.

In April, the Service Team from Immaculate Conception Church held a diaper and formula drive for us. We received 27 packages of diapers and 7 canisters of formula. This was a huge blessing as diapers and formula are two of our biggest costs beyond our usual overhead (rent, internet service, etc...)

In May we held our annual Mother's Day Flower sale. This was another successful year and is a big help in offsetting our overhead costs. We are truly grateful to all who help out in the preparation that goes into this, and to all who support us through this event.

In June St.Catherine's of Siena Church held a Father's Day flower sale for us in which they raised and donated \$546 for our organization. We appreciate their role in supporting our organization.

Over the summer we had a high school student volunteering with us. She was a delightful volunteer, eager to help in any way she could, even sorting through 38 years of files with me! I put this here to let people know that this is an excellent way for high school students to put in service hours for their civic class or confirmation service requirement.

In October, three of the Birthright staff attended the NYS Birthright Conference in Albany. It was a great chance for me to meet other NYS directors and get an idea of how other Birthrights are operating. The three of us also had a chance to take part in some very informative workshops on working with Generations Y and Z. It is a different world than many of us grew up in, and the information presented was valuable to us.

Also, in October, Carolann Darling and I spoke at an Area Congregations Together

meeting to introduce Birthright to other churches that may not know of our services. There were about 12 denominations represented and they were all happy to hear of our mission. We left them with several brochures and I will be following up with them in the new year to see if they would; like any more in depth information.

And of course, November brought our first ever luncheon event. A huge success that we hope to repeat every other year. Since this was a great success, Carolann Darling has agreed to help us out on a regular basis as a fundraiser coordinator, something we very much need if we are to secure a spot in a downstairs location.

I would like to take a moment to mention a few needs of Birthright at this time. You or someone you know may very well wish to help, so please spread the word. Birthright is in need of:

- A downstairs, downtown location (with at least 650 sq. ft.) is imperative!

- VOLUNTEERS are in great need!

- A newer updated computer (ours is very slow at about 13 years old or so)

- Always size 5 diapers
- Enfamil with Iron formula

And now, I just want to take a moment to say thank you for all the ways in which you help us, whether that be through donations of material items, monetary donations, or prayers. It is because God has put it on your heart to help support us. We could not do it without you.

We are praying that you all have a very Blessed, Merry Christmas and New Year. May God bless you all!
