Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,



## ***Exodus 90***

Here in North America in the 21<sup>st</sup> Century, living is easier than it has ever been in the history of mankind. Not many of us worry about having a warm place to sleep, food to eat, or clothes to wear. It's easy to become self-absorbed, to forget our blessings, and to not think about the source of all goodness. When life is good, we tend to forget about God. We tend to become trapped, enslaved, by the things that make life easy.

A group of men have banded together to help each other break free from the slavery of worldly entrapments through a program called Exodus 90. Exodus 90 is a spiritual exercise that brings men together to help each other become better husbands, fathers, and followers of Christ. It is based on the traditions of the Desert Fathers of the early church. It is based on the fundamentals of scripture, prayer, fraternity, and asceticism. Members commit to daily reflections on scripture and a nightly *examen* - a self-evaluation of the day. Each local group gathers at least weekly for faith-sharing, prayer, and mutual support in maintaining commitment to the practices. The ascetic practices of Exodus 90 include fasting, abstaining from sweets and alcohol, avoiding electronic entertainment, avoiding material purchases, and (most popular) cold showers.

These practices of prayer and self-denial have helped Christians follow God more closely for centuries. The program enables men to break free from the addictions of food, alcohol, pornography, material possessions, unhealthy relationships, and a stagnant faith. Exodus 90 was developed by Father Brian Doerr at Mount St. Mary's Seminary in Maryland to help men preparing for the priesthood, but the program has expanded to men of all walks of life worldwide. Daily reflections are online and there is a small monthly cost.

Last year a group of 12 men formed an Exodus 90 chapter here in Ithaca. Some have moved away, but many of us are planning to re-commit in 2020. The program runs 90 days, starting on January 12 and ending on Easter Sunday. We welcome new members to our group which has been meeting early on Saturday mornings. We also encourage formation of other groups - starting dates and meeting times for new groups are completely flexible. ## ***Something New at Calvary Cemetery***

There is something new coming to Calvary Cemetery on Five Mile Drive, Ithaca. The Immaculate Conception Parish Cemetery Committee is studying alternative interment options for our deceased loved ones.

For several years now we have recognized an increase in the number of interments of cremated remains at Calvary Cemetery. Over the last several years, the percentage has risen from 28% to the current 57%. Although there is presently an area designated in the cemetery for in-ground interment of ashes, the committee has decided to study the option of above-ground interment of urns.

This would be accomplished by positioning a columbarium on the cemetery grounds in the open space just east of the Queen of Peace Mausoleum. By definition, a columbarium is a group of niches (spaces) which contain cremated remains. One or two urns can be interred in one niche. An example of a columbarium with a walkway is shown here. The committee also plans to develop a memorial garden with seating around the columbarium. We have received landscaping advice from Mr. Mitch Glass who is a Visiting Lecturer at Cornell University.

A project of this magnitude in our cemetery will require substantial financial support. The price per niche (holding 2 urns) is yet undetermined as we need to establish the cost of the columbarium plus the cost of the garden. It is, however, the committee's desire to make this an economical alternative to in-ground burials.

The Committee did a survey this summer and many parishioners showed an interest in columbarium interment. It is important to determine if parishioners would be willing to make pre-payments for niches since funds will be needed to make the initial purchase. The committee is asking parish members to think about their final arrangements and if columbarium interment is of interest, to please e-mail or leave a text message to the below contacts. We would like to create a list of interested people.

There would be no commitment expected at this time because we have not yet determined the prices. We will provide you with more information as it becomes available. # Going...Gone

In my 18 years of ministry with young people and families I have witnessed a lot when it comes to trends, the family unit, and identity and participation as a Catholic. As you look around on any given weekend, I am sure that all of you have the same question; “where did everybody go?”

It is no secret that Mass attendance has dropped within the past decade in Catholic churches, as has attendance at non-denominational and protestant churches across the country. There has been such a decrease in people associating themselves with the Catholic church, or even any religion, that it sparked a joint research study between CARA (Center for Applied Research in the Apostolate) and St. Mary’s Press. What came from the study poses a great challenge for many churches. Below are some key statistics from the research and what we as a parish community can do to better evangelize to young people and families within our parish as well as to those who are on the fringes.

From the study, we learned that there are 20 million former Catholics, most of whom leave church affiliation before age 21. Thirty-five percent of former Catholics are between the ages of 18-29, and 54% of the unaffiliated Catholics are between the ages of 30-64. This group of non-affiliated Catholics has been coined the “Nones.”

When individuals were asked “at what age did you stop identifying as Catholic,” the median age was 13. It is important to note they were asked about when they stopped “identifying as Catholic” not when they stopped attending Mass. This is an important distinction with great implications. That means that young people may be at Mass, in our religious education programs and preparing for sacraments, such as Confirmation, but they have already mentally, emotionally and spiritually checked out. The big question is “why?” What I would argue is that many communities have been good at helping young people with being “churched” but have not done as well with helping young people and families being “Gospeled.” When asked why they no longer affiliate, the answers are wide and varied; which means that there is no one single solution.




Bob McCarty, former Executive Director of The National Federation of Catholic Youth Ministry and key contributor to the research, states that young people have 5 basic hungers. They are searching for meaning and purpose, seeking connection, seeking recognition that they have gifts and talents to offer the faith community, longing for a sense of the Holy, and strive for a deep sense of justice - meaning they want to help others to better their lives. The underlying question of young people is “where are my hungers being fed?”

The question for us as a parish is “are we helping young people in our parish feed these hungers? Do we welcome young families, children and teens? Do we see them as a gift to our parish or do we see them as a distraction? Do we help young people as they struggle with and explore the question of the meaning and purpose God has for them? Do we encourage them to use their gifts and talents and allow “mistakes” as occasions for growth and learning rather than being critical of those mistakes? Do we provide opportunities to experience the Holy and welcome their participation and leadership in community devotions? Do we seek out their help and welcome their participation in service on parish committees and service to our community? Feeding these hungers is not simply an issue to be addressed by a pastor or by parish staff. This is a community issue that requires effort from our entire parish.

Our Church is at a key point in history. Our greatest challenge is passing on faith to younger generations in a secular age. We are each called to help young people foster a faith they claim as their own and one that they believe with their hearts truly matters? We must work to make our faith not just a cognitive one but an affective one; one that is not only of the head, but of the heart. When we do that, we feed the hungers of our young people and help them experience the Gospel in a very real way. So, how can you help feed these hungers? As one responsible for ministry to young people and families in our parish, I encourage you to pray about how you can feed the hungers of our young people.
